SPIRIT MOUND HISTORIC PRAIRIE

Much progress has been made in an attempt to step into the visual past and recreate a microcosm of the great prairie that Lewis and Clark encountered on their trek to Spirit Mound in 1804. Structures have been removed from the Spirit Mound Historic Prairie. Badly eroded areas like the old feedlot have been contoured. Some trees still need to be removed.

What was the prairie vista like 200 years ago? The journals of Lewis and Clark make it clear that the only trees they saw from the mound were along the "Missouris Points" and "Whitestone Creek" (today's Vermillion River). An excerpt from Captain Clark's journal is very eloquent:

The Surrounding Plains is open void of Timber and leavel to a great Extent: hence the wind from whatever quarter it may blow, drives with unusial force over the naked Plains and against this hill;

The area (320 acres) of Spirit Mound Historic Prairie is too small to attain the richness of fauna and flora (species diversity) that existed 200 years ago. Bison and elk will not likely be observed. We still hope the visitor can obtain some sense of traveling back through time.

Land previously in soybeans has been planted with nine native grass species and 19 native forbs, including rough blazing star, aster, and compass and cup plants. All were acquired from nearby sources at approximately the same latitude as Spirit Mound. From the mound these species will create the illusion of a highly diversified prairie.

Visitors on the trail, which is marked but not yet constructed, will sense even more diversity. On both sides of the trail 36 native forbs will accompany the nine grass species. In seasonally wet (mesic) areas other grasses will be planted. These were purchased by funds obtained through the Vermillion Basin Water Development District.

On the dry (xeric) sloping mound drought resistant grasses and forbs are scheduled for planting.

The expert at prairie design is David D. Breyfogle of "The Prairie Stewardship Project." The building tools for this work in progress are burning, brush and weed control (sometimes with spot applications of herbicide), mowing, interseeding, and in some cases, especially on steep slopes, the planting of plugs. Planting the steep dry mound will require community volunteers. Members of the Spirit Mound Trust and the Sierra Club worked together last fall to broadcast pasque flower seeds. The Sierra Club donated funds to the Trust for the purchase of seeds in an effort to increase species diversity. We intend to give other community groups the opportunity to help us recapture the past prairie by planting seeds or plugs.

It will take many years to have a "true" historic prairie. In fact it can never be attained, since some species are extinct, and some so rare that it is impractical to attempt planting on a small piece of land. However, with your physical and financial assistance we hope to allow visitors to experience the illusion that they are with those with undaunted courage. Plant species "new" to all but trained botanists will be seen by most of us. We will remember that Lewis and Clark saw them when they had never been described in the scientific literature, when many of the native plants were known only to the Native Americans.

SPIRIT MOUND MAY BECOME NATIONAL HISTORIC LANDMARK

The S. D. State Historical Preservation Office has engaged Ethnoscience, a research firm in Billings, Montana, to conduct a comprehensive cultural and historic study of Spirit Mound.

Ethnoscience staff members read numerous historical documents and interviewed a number of people. Their report will be used to support the Preservation Office's nomination of Spirit Mound as a National Historic Landmark, the highest level of recognition for a historic site. Currently the site is on the National Register of Historic Places.

TRUST RECEIVES AWARD

The Lewis and Clark Trail Heritage Foundation presented the 2002 Heritage Award to the Lewis & Clark - Spirit Mound Trust at the Foundation's annual meeting in Louisville, Kentucky, July 31, 2002. The award, in the form of a commemorative plaque, recognizes significant contributions to the preservation of sites important to the Lewis and Clark Expedition.

VERMILLION'S LEWIS AND CLARK FESTIVITIES SET FOR AUGUST 23-25

Vermillion's annual commemoration of Lewis and Clark's visit to Spirit Mound will be August 23-25, 2002. Events will include a wacipi, workshops on Native American Culture, the First Annual Lewis & Clark Keel Boat Race, Lewis & Clark re-enactors, and a trek to Spirit Mound.

On Sunday, August 25, you may follow in the footsteps of Lewis and Clark by hiking from Cotton Park to Spirit Mound. The walk will begin at 8:00 am and will take about six hours. A registration fee, which includes lunch, water, snacks, and a booklet, will be charged.

For those not interested in making the trip by foot, vans will be available for guided tours on both Saturday and Sunday.
